

Simon, Peter, The Rock

What do we know about the disciple, Peter? 1. His given name was Simon, he was a fisherman, he was a denier, and he ran away and hid. 2. He was a brother to Andrew, he was a friend, he was a leader and Jesus called him to be one of His disciples. When Peter needed prodding, Jesus called him Simon. Jesus recognized the leadership qualities in Peter.

However, Jesus knew that Peter needed to be honed, molded, nurtured, and shaped into the man Jesus had chosen to spread His word after His death and resurrection. Jesus knew He had to lean on Peter. By calling him Simon, Jesus was trying to discipline Peter and set him on the right course. But Peter was human and made human mistakes. On the night of Jesus' arrest, Peter failed Jesus again. Before the cock crowed, Peter had denied Jesus three (3) times.

As the days months and years went by, Jesus taught Peter many ways of using his leadership skills the right way. Peter learned submission over being the boss. He learned restraint over outspokenness. He learned to show humility over his pride. Jesus washing the disciple's feet, taught Peter to be a loving servant to others.

Compassion for others is hard for some people. However, showing compassion when someone is hurting is what Jesus' love is all about. Peter also learned how to have courage. When the Holy Spirit settled on the crowd at Pentecost, Peter found the courage he needed to preach the Word of God to all who would listen. Peter was now the "ROCK" THAT Jesus knew was inside Peter.
